FedStats is a gateway to statistics collected and published by the federal government. It allows users to obtain facts and figures and track trends across a range of topics, including disability issues, by centralizing access to statistics from more than 100 federal agencies. Users do not need to know which agencies cover which issues to find the data they need.
